

Parent Update – December 2019

Dear Parents/Carers,

It has been a long, but very productive Autumn term, with our new Year 10 and 12 cohorts settling in well to UTC Swindon life. No doubt everyone is looking forward to a well-earned break over the festive period and this is a good time to reflect on the start to this academic year, with students completing assignments and several subject assessments and both internal and external exams having been taken.

As the end of term approaches, please be aware that there is a slight change to the end of term, with lessons ending at the end of **Wednesday 18th December**. On **Thursday 19th December**, we have **Year 10 and 11 Academic Review Day**, for which information and appointment sheets have been sent out previously and all students are expected to attend, with parents/carers if possible. Year 12 and 13 students are welcome to work in school or independently at home.

A staff training day has been scheduled for **Friday 20th December**.

Academic Progress

All students will receive an Autumn progress report on Wednesday 18th December. Information about grades is included and the reports will indicate current levels of performance, a predicted grade for the end of Year 11/13, along with a measure for Attitude to Learning. I am writing to inform you of the opportunity to meet with myself and Jon to discuss the challenges of the GCSE English exams that your child will be taking next year. We are very proud of the progress of our Year 11 students in English, and would like the opportunity to share this success with you. We are also aware that English is a difficult subject to revise for, and wanted to share some examples of good practice, and highlight some of the difficulties that traditionally arise from these exams.

On Thursday 19th December, we will be having our next Academic Review Day with Key Stage 4, and would like to invite you to meet with us for a half an hour English-focused session on this day. Your child will receive their Academic Review appointment form this week, and we have blocked off a morning and afternoon slot, depending on which time best suits your need. This will be an informal opportunity to meet with us, provide an overview of the papers and revision resources available, and answer any questions you may have. The times available will be either **12.15pm** or **4.00pm** – if you would like to attend either of these, please ensure that you do not have any clashes with any other staff bookings!
